## **Rahul K. Bhardwaj**

President and CEO, Toronto Community Foundation  
*Toronto's Vital Signs - Building a "Happy" City*

In his role as the President & CEO of the Toronto Community Foundation, Rahul Bhardwaj has been working to engage philanthropy to improve the quality of life in Toronto. Formerly a corporate lawyer with a leading Canadian law firm, he was also Vice President of the Toronto 2008 Olympic Bid.

As part of the Mayor's Blue Ribbon Fiscal review panel in 2008, Rahul was involved in identifying efficiencies for the City of Toronto. A year later the Province of Ontario appointed him to the Board of Metrolinx, an organization developing and implementing an overall transit strategy for the Greater Toronto and Hamilton Area. More recently, Rahul was Chair of the 2012 Ontario Summer Games, the first multi-sport games to be held in Toronto. He is the past Chair of the Toronto Downtown Jazz Festival and his board commitments, past and present, include Upper Canada College, George Brown College, Community Foundations of Canada, Stratford Festival of Canada and United Way Toronto, among others.

In 2012, Rahul's commitment to city building was recognized as he received the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal and was named one of "The 50 Most Influential" people in the city by *Toronto Life* magazine. His vision for Toronto has made him a popular presenter and speaker, particularly on issues relating to the city, community and leadership as well as Toronto's Vital Signs®. Rahul is a frequent contributor on TV, radio, and print in Toronto, and has been featured on CBC News Network, and internationally on CNN and China's National Daily News.

# IMAGINE NOISE

The *New Opportunities for Innovative Student Engagement (NOISE)* project is a research-informed model for enhancing the academic success of youth from the Jane/Finch community and York University Social Work students through engaged learning opportunities that energize and support their civic engagement and psycho-social well-being. Jane/Finch youth fellows and Social Work student fellows work together in community action pods on social action projects relevant to contemporary socio-political-economic conditions in the Jane/Finch community.

## Why Make NOISE for Jane/Finch youth and Social Work Students?

Youth in priority neighborhoods have a lower rate of post-secondary education compared to youth in the rest of the City of Toronto. Research shows that youth who participate in engaged learning opportunities such as NOISE – connecting what they are learning in the classroom to community action – will experience better academic results, increased enjoyment of learning, and will be more likely to pursue post-secondary opportunities.

NOISE provides youth fellows with the opportunity to build networks with other youth, and with York University students, faculty and alumni; increase their self-esteem and belief in their ability to make change; and explore university or college campuses and requirements. NOISE sees education as an intervention that allows youth to imagine new possibilities.

NOISE provides Social Work student fellows with the opportunity to work collaboratively with other students, faculty and alumni, and with youth; to build bridges between theory and practice, grounding academic concepts in real-world contexts; and earn volunteer hours or course credits.



# BENEFITS OF A NOISE FELLOWSHIP

**Relationships, knowledge, and power** are at the heart of all social change. By bringing together youth, Social Work students, faculty and alumni, NOISE provides fellows with the chance to build relationships, develop **knowledge** of unjust and oppressive experiences and systems, and be part of meaningful change across **differences** of age and experience. NOISE also provide an excellent opportunity for York's undergraduate and graduate students and alumni to work collaboratively with local youth on projects that allow them to ground academic concepts in real-world contexts.

- **YOUTH FELLOWS** build networks with other youth, and with York University students, faculty and alumni; increase their self-esteem and belief in their ability to make change; imagine new possibilities; explore university or college campuses and requirements.
- **SOCIAL WORK STUDENT FELLOWS** work collaboratively with other York University students, faculty and alumni, and with youth to complete a social action project that addresses community issues; build bridges between theory and practice, grounding academic concepts in real-world contexts; earn volunteer hours or course credits.
- **SOCIAL WORK ALUMNI FELLOWS** stay connected to the School of Social Work; build connections with community members, current students, professional colleagues, and faculty members; participate in social action projects for social change; enhance their understanding of youth and urban issues. Alumni bring their knowledge of York's critical approach to social work, informed by a commitment to human rights, social justice, and anti-oppression, to NOISE, thereby building a stronger School of Social Work and Jane/Finch community.



**What Is the Academic Component Of NOISE?**

NOISE youth fellows earn the 40 hours of community service required for their Ontario Secondary School Diploma through their participation in the social action projects. NOISE Social Work fellows (first year BSW students) earn the 40 hours of volunteer service required for AP/SOWK 1010.

NOISE Social Work fellows (BSW) complete a directed reading course: AP/SOWK 4210 – Critical Youth Work: A Praxis Experience In Theory, Practice, And Policy. NOISE Graduate Assistants (MSW) complete a directed reading course: GS/SOWK 5970 – Critical Youth Work: A Praxis Experience In Theory, Practice, Policy, And Research.

**What is the Experiential Component of NOISE?**

The NOISE fellows learn about community-based research and use these skills to engage in reflective, hands-on social action projects in the Jane/Finch community to address one of six issue areas outlined in Toronto’s Vital Signs Report – Learning; Arts and Culture; Environment; Safety; Gap Between Rich and Poor; and Leadership, Civic Engagement, and Belonging.

The social action projects ground academic concepts in real-world contexts and allow the youth and students to learn from each other and from alumni and faculty. These social action opportunities differ from traditional service learning projects in which students are conceptualized as the ‘volunteers’ and youth as ‘recipients’ thereby negating the strengths that each group possesses..

NOISE prioritizes multidirectional learning and accountability among all participants in the pod and recognizes that youth, students, alumni, and faculty all contribute important skills and experiences and mutually benefit from their multidirectional relationships. Each pod is facilitated by an MSW Graduate Assistant and includes a Social Work alum fellow and a faculty adviser.



**KEY COMPONENTS OF NOISE**

In August 2012, in partnership with the Assets Coming Together for Youth research project, NOISE hosted a Summer Learning Retreat (SLR) at York University for youth fellows. The SLR prepares them for their Fall and Winter pod work by providing engaged learning opportunities that focus on research methods, collaborative practices, leadership, and team-building.

In August 2013, the SLR will be opened to Social Work student fellows. At the end of the SLR, pods will be formed. Each pod will include youth, social work students, alum and a faculty adviser.

From September to December, pods meet once every week to plan and research their social action project. In December, NOISE organizes a full-day pod planning retreat in December that culminates with social action project plan presentations to the NOISE community.

From January to April, pods work on their social action project while completing the academic component of NOISE – a directed reading course on Critical Youth Work. In late April, NOISE holds a Spring Festival of Learning that showcases the lessons learned from the social action projects undertaken by the pods.

Throughout the year, NOISE holds Dialogue Circles that bring all fellows together to share stories and reflections on social change making.
