

Learning Gap Between Rich and Poor

- We began by examining the gap between the rich and the poor and how this is so glaringly visible within a publicly funded school system.
- There were many discussions about why the school was in such a state of disrepair.
 - According to the Fraser report, almost half of Emery students are not passing Ontario standardized tests. If many families are living in poverty, youth don't have access to internet and computers for homework so there is a clear cumulative effect on testing.

STUDENT ENGAGEMENT

 Many times, it was interpreted that adults don't care about students and that we are not valuable.

Why is your project important and what did you accomplish?



- Having proper technology at school is important for youth to do well.
